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### Course Texts:

### Course Description:

In this course, we will spend the fall examining works by Newbery Award winning authors. Our goal will be to examine the characters, settings, and themes of the books. We will analyze writing style and genre. We will also take a peek into the lives of these authors to find out what inspired their writings. We will write journal entries, summaries, opinion pieces, and create other works in response to what we read. We will practice citing the author's work to support our opinions and responses. Our writing goal for the fall is to write strong paragraphs in preparation for a personal essay.

### Course Requirements:

- Students will complete weekly reading and writing assignments. Assignments should take 3-5 hours each week.
- Students will be given two composition notebooks a reading response journal and a writer's notebook. There will be 2-4 short reading responses each week. These will be written in the composition notebooks.
- Bring one pocket folder for organizing class handouts.
- One longer writing piece or project will be assigned at the conclusion of each novel.
- Students will choose one Free Choice book from a list to read throughout the semester. To showcase their connections to literature, the students will use this book to complete a project from a choice menu to present at the end of each semester.
