

## Poetry Project: *The Underneath*

Assigned January 25, 2017

Due February 1, 2017

To finish our study of *The Underneath* by Kathi Appelt, you will write two poems to read aloud to the class and display in the hallway. You may choose two types of poetry that we have studied – haiku, acrostic, cinquain, rhyme, free verse, shape, or two-voices. You will write and present two different types of poems. These poems may be ones you have written in your journal during our weeks of practice. Maybe you want to take one of those poems and tweak it a bit to make it better. Make sure that your poems follow these requirements:

- Poems follow the proper structure of the type of poem – see website for class handouts if you've misplaced yours
- At least one of your poems must include a character, object, or emotion from *The Underneath*.
- Both poems must include anthropomorphism – giving human characteristics to inanimate objects, animals, forces of nature, or other objects
- Poems should include appropriate grammar (depending on the type of poem) and spelling.
- Poems should be neatly presented. The should be typed or neatly handwritten. Glue your poems to some sort of background (construction paper, scrapbook paper, etc.) that will look nice hanging in the hallway. Identify the type of poem you are presenting and give your poem a title.  
**This project is not to be completed in your homework journal.**
- Poems will be performed orally in class, so don't forget to practice reading your poem aloud using a loud voice, clear pronunciation, steady pace, and appropriate expression.
